The Auction of Promises in October was a great success. We had over fifty lots covering a wide price spectrum from fruit cakes to foreign holidays. EAST COKER PLAYGROUP

Happy New Year to you all! The Playgroup is looking forward to the Spring Term 2009, although as I type this, the weather is hovering around freezing and spring seems a long way off. Still, the child in me loves to see the natural world around us waken from its winter slumber and this is true for the children at the playgroup. It is a delight to share with them the wonder of the end of winter and coming of spring. The changes in the trees from bare branches to buds to the leaves, tips of emerging bulbs and later the delicate flowers, the hard frozen ground (very noticeable this year) turning soft once more and probably muddy with the rain. Our children at East Coker Playgroup are so fortunate with the countryside location; immediate access onto the playing fields enables the group to witness at first hand to changes in season and to experience the weather. Kay, her staff and the children make the most of the setting by getting outside daily (even the rain will not put them off – wellies and waterproofs are fully used). It is fitting perhaps that the topics this term are Weather and Seasons, followed by Transport later in the term. These topics are simply a base to start from; the children tend to take the theme where they want to go, the idea being that the children learn from what interests them individually and as group. During the term, the group will also celebrate the Chinese New Year. Take Art are also visiting the group, doing a creative project using clay. There will be some interesting sculptures produced, I am sure.

The Craft Fair held in November raised over £900, a massive thank you to everyone. Please contact the group if you are interested in having a stall at our next Craft Fair in November 2009.

NOTES FROM THE OBSERVATORY

New Year's Day, 2009.

Although winter officially begins on the Winter Solstice, which, last year was on 21 December, winter began early. The first weeks of December were the coldest for over thirty years and a desperately cold spell continued over Christmas and into the New Year. The weather pattern today is similar to that of the long freeze of 1962/3 when a blocking high to the north with a low over France pulled in icy winds from a very cold Europe. But it is January, when cold days are the norm, but perhaps not as cold as the winter days that prompted Shakespeare to write in his poem Winter

'When all aloud the wind doth blow, And coughing drowns the parson's saw; And birds sit brooding in the snow, And Marion's nose looks red and raw'

Even Byron had a poor opinion of the British winter:

'The English winter--- ending in July, To recommence in August'

Prophetic words perhaps for 2008, which was not a good year for balmy weather. Apart from a few mild and dry spells, the year was a gloomy one, lacking in sunshine for much of the summer.

Measurable rain fell on 159 days giving a total for the year of 914mm (36.01ins). The wettest spell was the evening of 12/13 December when 38mm fell (1.5 ins). The year had a few warm spells with a maximum temperature of 26.2C (79.2F) on 28 July the lowest temperature occurred on the night of 16/17 February when the mercury fell to minus 5.6C (22F). Frost occurred on 28 days the last day of the old year being a very cold day when the temperature remained below freezing for the whole day.

Wildlife suffered from a generally damp and sunless summer. Very few butterflies were about. Even common species such as Small Tortoiseshells were noticeably absent. But a few Large Whites flew as late as 19 October when the temperature was 10C (50F) and a solitary Comma fed from late ivy flowers. Other occasional sightings included few Brimstones and Speckled Woods.

Autumn leaf colours were exceptionally good. The poor summer was probably just what the leaves required to enhance their dying shades.

Perhaps the most exciting report was the sighting of a rare visitor from the U.S.A., the Dark-eyed Junco which appeared in the village in late November. Reports of this small sparrow-like bird in East Coker appeared in the national press and even on the Internet. Quite a few bird-watchers from far away turned up to see the stranger. Other sightings reported to me included a Firecrest on 17 November, Little Owls at Darvole and a Little Egret seen at Sutton Bingham. It is thought that the Egret may have come from a colony established on wetlands north of Weymouth. A Redwing appeared in the garden on 18 November, perhaps a sign of the later hard winter. A decided lack of robins was noticed in our gardens by some correspondents.

Venus has been a prominent sight in the evening sky, low down in the west just after sunset. In November Venus and Jupiter came together in the western evening sky giving a splendid rare sight of both planets close together. An annular eclipse of the sun on 26 January will not be visible from the village.


