The East Coker District total to date is just over £7,500, with a little gift aid to be added. In 2015 we raised £7,901.25. The RBL overall total was £48. 5million.


Our Service personnel past and present, their families and dependants are forever grateful for the support we give them as they go through difficult times. On behalf of them all I thank you all for your support.

A lot of you will be aware that 2017 is the 100th Anniversary of the Battle of Passchendaele, from 31 July to 6 November 1917. The last battle of WW1, in which Harry Patch from Somerset, "The Last Fighting Tommie" took part. Harry was out of the war long before the battle ended. On 22 September 1917 when returning with his five-man Lewis Gun team from the front line, a German shell burst above their heads. Three of the team were killed, Harry and the other team members suffered serious injuries from shrapnel. After the war he ran his own plumbing business around Somerset including the Yeovil area employing 28 men, retiring at the age of 65. Harry never spoke of his experiences (about which are now well written) until he went into a care home aged 100. He passed away peacefully on Saturday 25 July 2009 aged 111.

It is my intention to put up a display in St Michael's for the period of the battle in memory of Harry and the 325,000 British and Canadians casualties of the battle.

Note for diaries – Friday 21 April 2017 – 7.30pm at East Coker Hall. The Branch Cheese & Wine Evening. There will be speakers, including a representative from the RBL Admiral Nurse Service – a community dementia nurse service, which offers specialist support, information and advice for the carers and people suffering from dementia. 
THE EAST COKER BULK OIL PURCHASE SCHEME

In January last year we paid 21.95ppl ex VAT and 28.90ppl, in July when we ordered 36,700 litres in 40 drops. Today 3 January, it's quoted at 41.78ppl, so the price seems to have recovered somewhat after the last couple of years. Let's hope it's about to recover from its Christmas peak. Because we buy in bulk for a small area, we usually beat the quoted price by two pence or so. As I said last time, it looks as though we might be back to the old routine of filling up in the summer and topping up in January/February.

Before you ask, I just do the donkey-work; collating the requirements, ringing round the suppliers and placing the order and you pay the supplier directly. Please note that with some suppliers the delivery note is also the request for payment and there may be a surcharge if you don't pay promptly. If you have already taken part and found it worthwhile, encourage your friends and neighbours to join in. The more we can order, the better the price.

To participate or with any questions, contact me, preferably by email pauledwards@waitrose.com or 864413. Email makes it much easier and quicker to circulate information and I do not divulge email addresses. I circulate an email reminder before co-ordinating each order. Let me know your requirements by 7.00pm on Wednesday 25 January. Please do not ring and ask what the price will be; I will not know it until I have collated the requirements and rung the suppliers.

EAST COKER PRIMARY SCHOOL



I am writing this on the penultimate day of term as I listen to Reception children and their buddies walking around the school 'singing' jingle bells with added percussion accompaniment while delivering Christmas cards to everyone! It just about sums up our Autumn term – busy, lively and at times very loud, but with the children at the centre of all the action!

The Year 4 and Year 5 pupils went on a weekend residential to Osmington Bay in October. The staff were very proud of the children's teamwork skills and their confidence to try new things. They were challenged with a very long and very fast zip wire, a giant swing, abseiling and climbing, tunnelling and quad biking! I was extremely impressed with their mature and responsible attitudes and how well they supported one another through some of the more scary activities.

This term, the whole school shared the same topic called 'Explorers'. Each class found out about a famous explorer and the junior children also studied William Dampier. We celebrated the end of our topic with an open afternoon for families to come and see the children's wonderful work. The work ranged from paintings, models and musical performances to movie making!

Early in the autumn term we created 'House Teams' named after local areas. The children also appointed House Captains who lead our team meetings every week. Our houses are Pendomer, Holywell, Hardington and Burton. Every pupil in the school is a member of a house and earns house points for a range of reasons from behaviour and attitude to personal achievements. This term' Burton house were the winners and earned non-uniform day!

Our Year 6 Ambassadors have been busy this term with their responsibilities. They have been manning the office Friday lunchtimes, showing round prospective parents and working as play leaders setting up and organising lunchtime activities for our infant pupils. They are also responsible for setting up the school hall for events and recycling. They do a fantastic job and it is a great opportunity for the children to improve their confidence and develop a better understanding of being part of a community.

Our school council has been set up again this term and they have been busy looking at plans to improve the infant playground. They will be contributing to this over the next two terms.

We have also held several events to help to raise money for a number of charities this term, which includes; Click Sergeant, Children in Need and the Poppy Appeal.

And finally, we have had a wonderful festive end to the Autumn term. We have had our infant Christmas Concert in which the children were amazing and performed brilliantly. THE TRIANGLE

In the autumn it had a make-over when all the old herbaceous geraniums were pulled up and lavender cuttings (*Lavandula angustifolia* 'Hidcote') put in. Most lavender thrives on poor soils and is fairly drought-tolerant so should flourish in these conditions.

100 mixed Cornish daffodil bulbs were planted in the plot along with a few of the short Pipit variety. They came direct from Fentongollan Farm on Lord Falmouth's Tregothnan estate at St Michael Penkivel in the far west. The clumps of grey-green felted leaves of *Lychnis coronaria*, under the signpost were grown from seed and kindly donated by Glenis Bowditch. As their bright vivid pink or red summer flowers are attractive to butterflies it's to be hoped they survive the winter. Wallflowers came from SSDC's Lufton nurseries. With Darren's help a thick covering of compost was laid overall.

Over the years *Cyclamen Coum*, the hardy winter-flowering cyclamen has slowly spread from a single specimen and both a pink and a white form of *Cyclamen Cilicium* return every autumn.

The Parish Council is responsible for funding most of The Triangle's plant material.

DRAFT EAST COKER PLAN PUBLISHED FOR CONSULTATION!

After many months of preparation over a period of years that has involved surveys, local consultation events, discussions with local authorities and others, the Draft East Coker Neighbourhood Plan has been formally published for consultation. This will involve asking a wide range of local and national organisations for their comments on the plan as well as providing another opportunity for local people to express their views.

The Plan has been prepared by a local group on behalf the Parish Council and has taken account of views expressed by the local community through surveys, questionnaires and other consultation events over the past few years. The group has also engaged with the District and County Councils, as well as other agencies.

The Plan will complement the South Somerset Local Plan, providing more detail, and local polices and will be used to help make recommendations on future planning applications in the Parish. As well as the detailed local planning policies, the Plan includes the Proposals Map which shows:

- Some areas proposed as Local Greenspace
- The existing Conservation Areas in the historic core of North and East Coker, as well some important views and vistas which it considered should be retained.
- An indication of sites that currently have planning permission for housing.

It is planned that the 8 week consultation period will end on Monday 20 March 2017, although this is subject to confirmation and notices will be placed around the Parish when the plan is published. All comments must be submitted by this end date.

Copies of the Plan with Comments Forms will be 'On Deposit' in the East Coker Hall, the Helyar Arms, the Forester's Arms, St Michael's Church and the Village Cafe. Please note that these are **not to be taken away**, or other residents will be deprived of their right to read them. Parish, District and County Councillors have also been given copies.


