FILMFLIX – Films at East Coker Hall



The East Coker film season recommenced last September with *Hidden Figures*, followed by *Their Finest* in October and *Viceroy's House* in November. Hopefully, those of you who supported the film nights enjoyed these screenings. Film Night is always the last Wednesday of each month. There was no film in December, but we will be back again on the last Wednesday in January 2018 with *The Levelling*, followed in February by *My Cousin Rachel* and in March by *Victoria and Abdul*. Please try to support the film nights which are put on for the benefit of the community. A lot of effort is put in by a few people, and we need to at least break even for each screening.

Wednesday 31 January – *The Levelling - Somerset, England* Trainee veterinarian Clover Catto returns to the farm where she grew up after hearing news that her brother Harry has died - an apparent suicide. Finding the family home in ruins following recent floods that devastated the area, Clover is forced to confront her difficult father Aubrey about the farm, the livestock and, crucially, the details surrounding Harry's death. As the funeral approaches, Clover's discoveries send her on an emotional journey of reckoning - with the land, her family and herself.

Wednesday 28 February – *My Cousin Rachel* A dark romance, based on the novel by Daphne du Maurier, tells the story of a young Englishman who plots revenge against his mysterious, beautiful cousin, believing that she murdered his guardian. But his feelings become complicated as he finds himself falling under the beguiling spell of her charms. Starring Rachel Weisz, Sam Claflin, Holliday Grainger, directed by Roger Michell.

Wednesday 28 March – *Victoria and Abdul* Based on Shrabani Basu's book Victoria & Abdul. The True Story of the Queen's Closest Confidant, this period piece is about Queen Victoria's latter life. It's 1887, and the British Empire is celebrating Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee. Among the kings and princes in attendance is Abdul Karim, a young clerk who has travelled to the event from his famine-ravaged India to present the aging monarch with a ceremonial coin. As the Queen questions the constrictions of her long-held position, the two forge an unlikely and devoted alliance with a loyalty to one another that her household and inner circle all attempt to destroy. As the friendship deepens, the Queen begins to see a changing world through new eyes, and joyfully reclaims her humanity.


Day trips planned for 2018

THE EAST COKER BULK OIL PURCHASE SCHEME – JULY 2017

I've left it until the last minute and the muse is still on her New Year break, so it's just the usual stuff this time. Speaking for myself, I haven't used much oil so far this winter, but as I've said before, I'm a bit of a skinflint. So my tank doesn't need a top-up. If yours does, then why not join in with our consortium and save trouble and a bit of money? In July, 69 of us (about half as many again as ever before) filled our tanks with 62,950 litres of heating oil. The price was 33.70 pence per litre (+ VAT), that's 0.75ppl less than the best price for 1,000 litres, but 3.35ppl less than the worst. Do the sums – even ³/₄ pence per litre for 1,000 litres adds up.

Before you ask, I just do the donkey-work; collating the requirements, ringing round the suppliers and placing the order and you pay the supplier directly. Please note that with some suppliers the delivery note is also the request for payment and there may be a surcharge if you don't pay promptly. If you have already taken part and found it worthwhile, encourage your friends and neighbours to join in. The more we can order, the better the price.

To participate or with any questions, contact me, preferably by email <u>pauledwards@waitrose.com</u>, or 01935 864413. Email makes it much easier and quicker to circulate information and I do not divulge email addresses.

I circulate an email reminder before co-ordinating each order. Let me know your requirements by 7:00 pm on Wednesday 24 January. Please do not ring and ask what the price will be; I will not know it until I have collated the requirements and rung the suppliers.

A meeting open to anyone to read a poem or two. Bring some poems to read or just come and listen and enjoy the ambiance. These meetings are always popular


Walking Wounded - The Poetry of Vernon Scannell (1922-2007) - Tuesday, 27 February 2018

EAST COKER WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Our big year has arrived. We are celebrating our centenary. On the 18 June 1918, eighteen East Coker ladies (whose husbands were still fighting or had been killed in the 1st World war) met to discuss the possibility of forming a branch of the Women's Institute in East Coker - just three years after the formation of the first Women's Institute in Great Britain. This branch has flourished ever since. Initially, the aim was to educate women with domestic classes and basic hygiene. The soling of boots and shoes with old tyres and making of gloves from rabbit skins were some of the earliest subjects, along with dress-making, dancing and singing. Our subjects have altered as time has passed, but the overall aim has stayed constant with education and comradeship very prominent.

The subjects for this year's Spring Programme are as follows. In January, we hear about the history of Fairgrounds, in February the Phelips of Montacute, in March we hold our Annual Meeting, and in April we have an executive of Yeovil Hospital speak to us.

Whist Drives, which are open to anyone who would like to join in, are held in the evening on the third Thursday of the month in the Dampier Room, with many prizes being awarded.

Fun and Games are also an extra event held once a month on a Monday afternoon. These sessions are open to anyone over the age of 50 years to encourage fitness whilst having fun. Just £2.50 gives participants two hours of enjoyment, and includes refreshments.

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH, SUTTON BINGHAM

Thank you to everyone who has supported services at Sutton Bingham in 2017.

We have been rather thin on the ground at times and we have had to cancel some services during Rev. Colin Simpson's holidays as we are not always able to find clergy cover, but above all Rev. Trevor Farmiloe has been exceptionally supportive in taking services.

Our two Christmas services were extremely well attended with an overflowing church at the Carol Service on 19 December, where the church looked, as usual, stunningly candlelit and atmospheric for over 70 in the congregation. Special thanks to Carol and Richard Blackmore and Mary Pisani and Olga, who decorated the church for this event, and to Mervyn Davis who came across from Sherborne to play the organ for us.

The Joint Benefice Service on the last Sunday - and last day - of the year was again a full church, with the collection being shared £115 each between the Somerset Churches Trust, who so generously supported our roof repairs in 2010, and St Margaret's Hospice – our own local charity. The Benefice Choir supported the singing, and Robin Carpenter played the organ and led the choir for their anthem – thank you to them and to all from the other churches who attended.

We have recently repaired the heating system – the storage heaters are now working well with the underpew heaters, and the timed magnetic locking system is fully functional again. We have moved the electrical work forward so that the winter services take place in a welcoming, warmer church. There is also some new, discreet lighting to help on dark mornings.

Kenwyn Brown, a regular at All Saints, has kindly agreed to take over as First Church Warden to help with the running of the church.

We have done very little fundraising recently, there being so few of us, but we would be very grateful for any support or ideas. We are, like most churches, struggling to make ends meet, and our small reserves will not last for very long.

We now have use of a portable Benefice Organ, but no one to play it for our 3rd Sunday services, so if anyone knows of anyone who might be able to help.....?

Likewise, we still have no Treasurer. It is not an onerous job, but if anyone has the time and some accountancy knowledge, we would appreciate their involvement!

THE TRIANGLE

After the three hebes which had grown too large for the plot were removed, daffodil bulbs were put in, again obtained directly from Fentongollan Farm. The farm covers 2,000 acres of prime agricultural land (170 down to daffodils) in the south west of Cornwall on and around the beautiful Tregothnan Estate and the Roseland Peninsula, where the Hoskin family has farmed as tenants of Lord Falmouth for 125 years.

The two varieties planted this year are: Fowey, a new Cornish introduction and Pipit, a miniature narcissus, lightly scented. Both should flower in April. Last year the daffodils were dug up after flowering with a view to drying the bulbs for replanting in the autumn but this proved unsuccessful.

Three modern shrub roses (Bonica) were planted in early December. This is a variety recommended for poor soil conditions, so should do well here.

My thanks to Karen, our Ranger, for her willing help when called upon.

Neighbourhood Plan As you know, our Neighbourhood Plan went for its independent Health Check in October 2017. The Health Check Examiner seemed quite impressed with it on the whole, with the exception of a few minor amendments, which we have now made.

He asked that the Neighbourhood Plan section of the Parish Council website be made more user-friendly which we have also completed, and you will find all the relevant information and documents together with the final draft of the plan on <u>www.eastcokerparish.com</u>. Just search for Neighbourhood Plan and it should all be there.

We have now forwarded all the documents to South Somerset District Council for them to arrange another 6-week consultation exercise known as Regulation 16 consultation, which will be handled by the SSDC. This will be advertised by them, but we will be pressing for this to be progressed as soon as possible in January.

Following this, SSDC will arrange for the Plan to be formally examined by an independent examiner, who will consider all the comments made on the Plan and may well recommend modifications. After this, the Plan can progress to the Referendum and hopefully, final approval.

Pavilion Recreation Grounds After improvements to the playing fields and the installation of semipermanent goals, it is hoped that all age groups for East Coker Cockerels Football Club will now be accommodated at the Pavilion. The Parish Council are also looking into refurbishing and improving the Pavilion, more details to follow. The fencing around the children's play area is being repaired, and these works should be completed soon.
