We wish you all a Happy New Year and hope you had a pleasant Christmas with all the presents you hoped you would get.

Our Christmas meal was held at the Royal Oak, Hardington at which all who attended had a pleasant meal and enjoyed the excitement of guessing what the Secret Santa had brought us.

The local WI welcomes new members for monthly get togethers to hear interesting speakers on a variety of different subjects, both educational and amusing. Meetings are held on the last Thursday of each month at 7.30pm at East Coker Hall. The talk is given before a refreshment and gossip break and a quick session of announcements. We usually finish by 9.00pm.

A fun competition is held each month, usually having some connection with the speaker's subject. The money raised is sent to the WI head office from where it is distributed to women in deprived countries. They are given the means to raise money themselves to help feed their family; this might be, for example, a hand worked sewing machine to make or mend clothes, or to provide a goat to produce milk for their own consumption or to sell.

We start our programme in January with a wine tasting with an emphasis on the effect food has on the taste. This will be given by a member of the local wine circle, David Pryor. April sees us sampling chocolate with a small quiz on what we taste.

EAST COKER VILLAGE HALL CHARITABLE TRUST

Built in 1979/1980, one of the largest in the area, with excellent parking and good facilities, the Hall was officially opened in 1981 and is now showing its age. Regular maintenance and repairs as well as various improvements have been carried out over the years. The small committee of dedicated trustees continues to work hard to ensure the Hall is kept up to a good standard.

The installation of replacement main entrance doors, which will improve security, ease of access and improved insulation for users, was expected during Autumn 2023, but there has been a delay. We hope installation will take place in the next couple of months.

Many of you will be aware that the roof is, yet again, causing issues (it leaks!). Options for the repair/replacement of the roof have been under investigation for several months. This has involved inspection by structural engineers, the reports of which have indicated that major work will be required. The Committee is considering the alternatives, all of which entail considerable expense. We are grateful to the organisers of the Village Christmas Lunch for their very generous donation towards funding of the roofing costs.

Many of you will have attended the Christmas Lunch at East Coker Hall and noticed the Christmas decorations. These are put up – and taken down - each year by dedicated members of the 'Decorating Team'. It takes around 4 hours to decorate the Hall – their efforts are greatly appreciated, and my thanks go to them for the excellent job they do.

Film nights recommenced in October with showings of Empire of Light and The Old Oak. Generally, these evenings are well attended, but increased audience numbers would be much appreciated. We try to show a varied range of films but are somewhat restricted by what Filmflix is able to supply. A small group helps to set up the Hall on the last Wednesday of the month, meeting at the hall at 6.30pm, ready for the doors to open at 7.00pm.

If you are able to assist in setting up, it would be greatly appreciated. It is not onerous, and you would not need to help every month. Either turn up at the hall for 6.30pm to help or contact Helen on 01935 862447.

The Hall is well used by a wide range of groups, clubs and classes, and is run by a committee of trustees. To ensure that the Hall continues to be a valued community facility, the current trustees would welcome new committee members to assist in the running of it. You should be committed and be prepared to take on the responsibilities associated with acting as a trustee.

EAST COKER FLOWER AND PRODUCE SHOW

The New Year has come round again, and it is time to think about the annual Show. Work has commenced on the schedule, which should be finalised in February. The various sections remain, for the most part, the same as in the past, with some amendments to the individual classes.

Get ready to – sow and grow, cook, and bake, arrange, sew and make, look and click, ferment and brew – and **show**! For the child – children, grandchildren, nephews, nieces, brothers, sisters, cousins, friends – get them making, baking, arranging, sowing and growing.

To encourage you to consider entering this year, here are the sections, with some of the classes noted, so that you may make a start:

Vegetables & Fruit – get sowing and growing! Much the same as in previous years (carrots, tomatoes, and courgettes).

Flowers - again, much the same as in previous years.

Floral Art – we would very much like to see more entries in these classes and will therefore be simplifying the titles.

Homecraft - we know you can cook, bake and preserve - after all, we all have to eat - so give it a go.

Arts & Crafts – again, we know many of you have nimble fingers and can sew, embroider, and knit, paint and sketch, and make wondrous, beautiful things.

Photography – this has always been very well supported. For 2024, you could enter any, or all, of the following - A photograph taken by young person up to 16 years of age. Farms and Farming - Forests or Trees.

Patterns or Textures – Reflections.

Close ups.

A group of 4 photographs representing 'East Coker', each 15.25 cm x 10cm (6in x 4in max) on one mount not exceeding 63.5cm x 30.5cms (15in x 12in)..

Children's classes - we would love to welcome more children to the Show, so please encourage them to enter. We always endeavour to make the classes interesting, not too difficult, and inexpensive to make. Classes are for children aged 5 years and under, 6 to 9 years, and 10 to 14 years. Children may, if they wish, enter any of the other classes in addition to the children's classes.

Wine Classes - entry in these has been poor over the last few years and you will see some changes when the 2024 schedule is printed and distributed, for example, a homemade cordial, homemade wine, homemade spirit, all to be made from foraged or home-grown produce.

Even if you haven't entered before, please have a go. It is fun and rewarding. Help will be available on the day to show you where, and how, to place your entries.

Happy New Year from everyone at East Coker Primary School!

What a wet few months it has been although that has not stopped the children from enjoying many exciting events and visits.

We have had our annual residential for Year 6, albeit a bit of a wet one as we marched through the woods to build shelters, climbed walls and giant ladders and took part in many team games. For some children this was the first time they had been away from home, and they had a fantastic time. The children's manners were impeccable, and the residential staff were very impressed with their behaviour and attitudes.

The Year 4 children enjoyed a visit to the Bristol Hippodrome for our annual musical theatre event. They saw Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. This year, we will be attending Aladdin the musical, which we are very excited about.

In our 'Once Upon a Time' topic, the children learned about key events in history such as WWII and the first man on the moon. The children have been busy cooking, sewing their own Christmas stockings, working with clay, and painting amazing designs using ink. The Year 5 and Year 6 children created some amazing artwork inspired by artists such as Tim Burton, Felix Steinberger and Michael Basquiat. They have also been learning about Bonfire Night and other festivals such as Diwali.

In addition to these activities, we had our charity days such as Children in Need and Remembrance, and the children and families raised lots of money to support these charities. The children also took part in many sports fixtures and events last term including hockey, motiv8 and sports festivals.

Throughout the term we had visitors in to support our curriculum. We were very excited to have the Royal Navy visit our Year 5 and Year 6 children for a STEM Day (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics). The children programmed drones, created special circuits to power model helicopter blades and used computer coding to control mini robotic spheres. We also had a fantastic talk from a local villager, David Holland, who brought in some artefacts and spoke to the children about WWII. We also had visits from the Heritage Centre for our younger children in juniors who found out more about what life was like during WWII.

At the end of the term, we were very busy with our many Christmas events, including our special whole school literacy event which this year was based on Raymond Briggs, The Snowman & Father Christmas. The infants also held two Christmas events. The 'Reception Sing a Long' and the infant nativity show 'Twinkly Nativity'.

The juniors held their Annual Christmas Carol Service at St Michael and All Angels' Church, compered by the children, with support from by Reverend Rod and Toffer. It was a really lovely way to end the term, and we are extremely grateful to be able to use the church. The new heating system was a lovely bonus as well!

Our theme this Spring term is 'Save The Planet', and we have already had a fabulous all-day workshop from Carymoor Environmental Trust, focusing on 'Schools Action Against Waste', and the children have been learning all about food waste. Next week, we have a spectacular science day which is to be delivered by 'Wonderstruck' and includes exploding rockets, fan powered cars and a special competition, all paid for with the money raised by PTFA events.

This term, we are also very excited to be working with Mr Simon Dicker at OSR projects in West Coker who organises the 'Od Arts Festival'. Children have been selected to take part in a number of clay workshops, creating and making clay projects using the kiln, something we cannot do in school. Last year, the work produced was outstanding and was commented on by the Ofsted inspector when they visited in May.

We are also working towards our Spring Concert in March which enables our very talented children to show off their musical prowess. Our theme this year is 'Pop Rock'.

We currently have places available in our current Reception and Year 1 classes should anyone be interested. Previously, we have been oversubscribed, but the fall in birth rate across Somerset has reduced our numbers slightly.

We are also very interested in anyone who wishes to come and support the children in school with their reading, design and technology sessions, such as sewing/cooking and general helping support. If you are interested, you will need to have a DBS which can be done through the school.

The Churches

ST MICHAEL AND ALL ANGELS' CHURCH

Despite being without a full-time rector, the past few months have been busy at St Michael's. The Annual Service of Remembrance on 12 November was, as ever, superbly organised by the Royal British Legion, and was well attended by East Coker Scouts and many villagers. Christmas was celebrated in style. We held a wonderful Candlelit Carol Service, for which the church was beautifully decorated, and on Christmas Day itself welcomed families for a service of holy communion.

Project Beacon, our plans to improve accessibility and use the church space in a more flexible and inclusive way, continues. Any work on a historic church needs a great deal of consultation and specialist surveying, and that important preparatory work continues. However, some early, non-contentious work has been done. We have refurbished the very dilapidated church path. Currently it has a temporary hoggin surface, but that makes it much safer and easier to navigate. More recently we have installed electric under-pew heaters. As well as being much more effective in keeping the congregation cosy, it is the first phase of a full heating refit, allowing us eventually to decommission our smelly, expensive, fossil fuel gobbling oil boiler. The best way to keep up to date with the Project Beacon, and to make suggestions and give feedback, is via the newly set up website www.projectbeacon.info.

The first few months of 2024 include some important milestones in recruiting our new rector. Adverts will have gone out in the middle of January with a closing date for applications of 14 February. We will shortlist soon thereafter and plan to interview candidates in the middle of March. So, you can see that we aren't dragging our feet, and we very much hope to have a new incumbent installed by the early summer of this year.

You are always welcome at St Michael's, whether for some time of quite reflection, or to join us for a service. MONICA'S MEMORIES – ALL CHANGE

Looking back over the last 90+ years, I am overwhelmed at the changes that have taken place. To me, perhaps the most far-reaching are those in the medical field, smallpox and polio have almost been eradicated. Gone are the wards of children paralysed and often in artificial lungs. 24/7 cataract surgery is done in outpatients instead of needing three weeks being nursed flat in a hospital bed, and hip surgery is now done in some cases as day surgery. Antibiotics have saved many lives. Research is well advanced in many other fields. Yeovil Hospital is expanding, and new departments are springing up in a very tight space.

Yeovil itself has changed beyond recognition. When I first came to Yeovil, Larkhill Road was mostly green fields. Just after the war, a few prefab houses were built at the bottom on the left, and although the lifespan was supposed to be 10 years, they were still occupied in 1964. At the top of Larkhill was the Dog Stadium and also a little cottage where I visited an elderly sick lady. She had no water, only a well, no gas or electricity. She cooked on an oil stove and used candles and had no sanitation, but she grew the biggest raspberries I have ever seen!

Another house I was a frequent visitor to was where Queensway is now. It was a haven of peace and the woman's son had fixed a high line from a window to the fence, with many birdfeeders hanging on it, so his mother could watch the birds from her bed. At Houndstone corner was an army training camp used for learner drivers. Now Yeovil is very changed.

Modern technology had developed apace, too fast for me, but bleeps and Satnavs would have made my life a lot easier in those days when I was trying to visit a sick person when perhaps the only address I had was Wood Farm, East Coker! It would have saved me money too as I always felt duty bound to buy a Mars Bar if I went into a local to enquire where Wood Farm was. Changes in transport have enabled me to visit both Australia and New Zealand twice, a 24-hour flight instead of a six week's boat trip. www.eastcoker.com Sadly, due to sight problems and age I have had to sell my beloved 'Yellow Peril' (car). That decision was made in the Autumn and took time and energy. (Has anybody got a use for a bottle of Sal Volatile? I got it in my first aid box purchased when I got a car in1961 at my mother's insistence!).

No doubt there will be many changes in 2024, hopefully for the better, so all I wish is a Happy, peaceful and healthy New Year to you all
