
By the time you get this newsletter the Cream Teas will be over. We hope those of you in the village who ordered from us enjoyed them.

SAVE EAST COKER

At last SSDC has announced the timetable for publication of its proposed Local Plan and the associated period of public consultation. All who made representations during the previous consultation period will have been notified by email or letter that the Plan will be published on 28 June and this will mark the start of a six week consultation period ending on 10 August. The letter/email also gives details of how to view the proposed Plan and make representations to the Council.

In the six-week public consultation period it will be essential that as many people as possible make written, or online, representations to SSDC about the published version of South Somerset Local Plan 2006-2028 (previously called the Core Strategy). These will be sent by the Council to the Planning Inspector and so it is crucial that he/she sees the evidence and the strength of feeling which exist against the Council's plans. None of the 3,000 representations which have been made so far will be carried forward after the final version of the Plan is published so it is vital that everybody makes their comments by 10 August.

To give everyone an opportunity to understand the key threats posed by SSDC's Plan and how objections should be made to be most effective, East Coker Parish Council, East Coker Preservation Trust and the East Coker Society are organising an open evening at the **East Coker Hall on 16 July at 7.00pm to 9.00pm**. This will be a 'drop in' style evening so please come along and discuss how you can best make representations to the Council.

The Trust is retaining planning consultants to assist in the formulation of its representations to the Council and we will continue to take legal advice on the best approach for this task. Looking to the longer term we will continue to work with our legal advisers in preparation for a legal challenge which may be needed if the published Plan is not significantly different from the previous Draft Core Strategy. As you will be aware, planning experts' and barristers' fees can be very costly so it is essential that we do everything we can to support the fund-raising events which are planned for the coming months.

We have set up a fund raising committee headed by Gloria Woodford. This team is currently planning a programme for the coming months. The first two events on the Monday of the Jubilee weekend – the Tombola at the Village Fete and the raffle at the evening Picnic at the Rec – got the task off to a flying start and we raised a total of £1200.

THE EAST COKER BULK OIL PURCHASE SCHEME

Having a top-up in January/February and a fill-up in July/August is working well. This January's order ran to 23,500 litres in 32 drops, so we were topping-up on a grand scale. The price of heating oil in pence has been between the low 50s and low 60s since February 2011 and as I write this on 20 June it is dropping. It must be a good time to fill up and as usual the more of us join in, the better the price we should get. As I've said before, the scheme is a great benefit to those who order less than 1000ltrs. In January larger orders saved almost 2p per litre over quoted prices for 1000+ltrs and smaller orders (the majority) almost 4p over the price for less than 1000ltrs. So we all helped each other.

Before you ask, we just do the donkey-work; collecting the requirements, ringing round the suppliers and placing the order and you pay the supplier directly. Please note that with some suppliers the delivery note is also the request for payment and there may be a surcharge if you don't pay promptly. If you have already taken part and found it worthwhile, encourage your friends and neighbours to join in. The more we can order, the better the price.

To participate, or with any questions, contact me, preferably by email (pauledwards@waitrose.com) or 864413. Email makes it much easier to circulate information and I do not divulge email addresses. I circulate an email reminder before co-ordinating each order.

Let me know your requirements by 7:00pm on Wednesday 18 July. Please do not ring and ask what the price will be. I will not know it until I have collated the requirements and rung the suppliers.

Sam's story

Sam Weale of Broadacres East Coker has again been selected for the Olympics in Modern Pentathlon. There are only two places available from Great Britain, and three competitors qualified. Sam is currently ranked 17th in the Olympic World rankings and has had to compete in many competitions all over the world this year to gain this qualification. It has been very tough, and there have been a few ups and downs along the way including faulty lazer targets last year in the European Championships, and a dodgy horse in the World Cup final in China recently, but he has battled on!

For those who don't know what Modern Pentathlon entails, I will give a quick résumé. The day starts with 2 and half hours of fencing. Half an hour later the warm up for the 200m swim begins. After the swim there is a short break for lunch and they are allocated a horse and have 20 minutes to get to know it and then have to jump 12 jumps in the riding arena of Olympic standard height! An hour later they are running 3000m with three stop-offs after each 1000m run to shoot 5 shots in the bullseye before they can run the next 1000m. It is a gruelling event, and what makes it even worse is they have to do the whole thing twice over as they have semi-finals and then a day's break and then the final. At least the Olympics event is a straight final, so is easier in that respect, but of course only the best 36 athletes in the world are there! It takes a lot of skill, endurance and dedication to do Modern Pentathlon but he loves it and has been his life for the last 14 years at least!

EAST COKER PARISH COUNCIL

Kim Close, South Somerset District Council Area Development Manager, attended the March meeting to explain the work of her team – providing front desk services at Petters House and regeneration of areas of the town. They want to work with rural areas and the Parish Council are currently seeking their support to improve facilities within the Parish.

East Coker Cricket Club sought the re-instatement of their practice wicket which had been removed by Western Power Services to enable a new pole to be erected. Paul Morton, Chair of the Cricket Club, had calculated costings for the materials and Councillor Kath Wilson was successful in making a funding bid to the Wellbeing of Yeovil Association for these costs, with the Parish Council funding the contractors, who will be supported by members of the club. There has been a delay in getting started, as East Coker Cockerels Football Club asked the Parish Council to consider the provision of a 9 v 9 pitch to support a new youth initiative of the Football Association. Unfortunately, after much measuring and investigation that has not been possible and so the practice wicket will be developed during late June/early July.

The Parish Council have been investigating the potential provision of a dog-waste bin at the end of Burton Lane. When the logistics of emptying the container and suitable positioning have been overcome, it is hoped to add this extra facility.

More refurbishment has taken place with the Pavilion having wood replaced and completely re-painted. Also an exterior tap has been installed to help the sports clubs to access water for the pitches more easily. At the same time, internal taps were replaced as the old ones were sub-standard and not efficient.

A number of Parish Councillors and other members of the community spoke at both the Area South and Full Council meetings and parishioners have been kind enough to come to thank people for their efforts. The working group of the Parish Council dealing with the Local Plan (previously known as the Core Strategy) are currently investigating the involvement of a Planning Consultant to help in the response to the Planning Inspector. There has been some slippage in South Somerset District Council's production of the final version of the Local Plan, which will have a consultation period of 6 weeks from publication.

The Parish Council will be distributing an information sheet at that time giving 'top tips' for those people who wish to respond. As previous responses will not be taken into account, this will be very important for those wanting to take action.

Councillors Horsley and Griffin produced an excellent funding bid for County Councillor Cathy Bakewell to apply for a Minor Highway Improvement grant to improve the walkway from Tellis Cross to the school. We will know the outcome of the bid within the next couple of months. The same councillors have been working hard to analyse the data collected from the County Council's speed survey through the village. It is hoped that a report will soon be ready and shared appropriately with parishioners.

For several months, there has been ongoing communication between the Parish Council and County Highways to repair the verge broken away at Darvole. Whilst there has been no positive response as yet, we will continue to try to put pressure on to have this potentially dangerous hole repaired. However, Highways have agreed to repair the corner of road fallen away in Halves Lane by inserting a 'sleeve'.

After several months of planning, the Parish Council were delighted with the support that was given to the Queen's Jubilee 'Picnic in the Rec' on Monday 4 June. It was apparent that people were enjoying themselves in spite of falling temperatures as the evening progressed!! Much hard work was undertaken by many people under the leadership of Councillor Stan Shayler. We would like to say a very big thank you to everyone who played a part in making the event such a success.

The surplus money that was generated will be put into Parish Council funds and used to enhance life within the parish. The first spend will be to replace the well used picnic table and benches in the play area at the Pavilion.

RAINFALL, EAST COKER

T S Eliot had me on toast in the month of May this year, when he wrote in 'Gerontion' (1920):

Here I am, an old man in a dry month Being read to by a boy, waiting for rain.

Actually, most of us in East Coker had been waiting to be rained on in customary degree for most of 2010 and 2011 – two years in which the average rainfall was well short of the prior fifteen years (38ins 96.5cm), and scarcely thirty inches (76cm) fell. 2012 started with no more than four inches (10cm) in the first quarter, and then things began to buck up. April 2012 yielded rain on twenty of its days, and generously enough to provide a total of 7¼ins (19cm) for the whole month. How the daffodils feasted, whilst the forest trees drank fulsomely.

May, however, did not follow its predecessor's copious example. It rained on only eight days, none of it heavy, and notching up only two inches (5cm) by 15 May, and no more in the second half of the month.

Fortunately, June was another matter, with several falls of heavy rain in the first twenty-one days and an exact total of 5½ins (14cm), (the month has another week from now to run while the Newsletter is printed). Suffice it, however, that the second quarter of the year has so far produced just over fourteen inches (35.5cm) of rain, and this level, if maintained for the rest of 2012, should return to at least the averages of 1996 – 2009. Keep your fingers crossed, the famous golfer Ron Smith being excused!


