We decorated our houses and public spaces; planted trees; lit a beacon at the Pavilion; opened a new seating area and garden at the junction of Mill Close and Long Furlong Lane; created a new Jubilee Walk; held an Exhibition of East Coker photographs, maps, press cuttings and other memorabilia; and decorated the Pavilion with paintings and drawings of the Commonwealth from the Primary School.



Joan and Bill Williams moved to East Coker in the 50's and Joan taught at East Coker School for many years. Bill also taught at the College in Yeovil. Over the years, she travelled to visit her daughter in Australia many times until quite late in life. The family kindly offered their donation to re-turf our outside play area when they visited East Coker and saw we had more mud than grass despite a donated re-seed earlier in the year. The garden now looks wonderful again, and we have also been able to purchase some outdoor rugs to preserve the grass, a barrel to play in and some numbered small tyres. The Preschool Committee, families and staff thank the family for their kindness.

EAST COKER PRIMARY SCHOOL

Over the past year, it has been a very stormy time for us here at East Coker both physically and metaphorically. We have been 'back to bubbles' for most of the autumn term and into the spring term due to the high levels of Covid cases of staff and pupils. Sadly, it was a similar picture across Somerset schools.

Thankfully, the summer term has been much more stable, and staff are starting to get 'back to normal', if there is such a thing in schools.

Despite these significant challenges, during the first part of the academic year we have been able to take part in some great events and activities. Our Year 6 pupils finally went on their residential, something which has had to be considerably watered down over the last two years. They spent a lovely week at Mill on the Brue activity centre in Bruton.

Our junior children have managed to have visits to Bristol Museum & Art Gallery, finding out about the Ancient Egyptians, and the Somerset Heritage Centre to investigate the Stone and Bronze Ages. Our Year 4's have visited Bristol Hippodrome to see 'The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe', and our Year 6's have spent the day at Melbury Farm and Estate. Not to be left out, the Year 3's had a lovely Wellbeing Day at Yeovil Town Football Club earlier this term.

Our infants have also been busy. They have had special celebration days such as a pirate day and a jubilee day. They will also be off to Ninesprings in the coming weeks for a science workshop. They have also been on a village walk last term to look for different types of houses and homes as part of their topic work.

In addition to this, we have been able to hold some lovely whole school events both with and without covid restrictions. The events included our Annual World Book Day, dress up parade, and book fair, PTFAs 'silly disco' and bingo night, and on **Friday 1 July, our Summer Fair will take place from 4.00-6.00pm**.

We have made up for the lack of clubs on offer during our Spring and Autumn terms with children attending a huge number of clubs from archery to basketball, football, choir and much more. We have had individual wins in numerous cross-country races and competed at the county finals football competition. We have also attended a number of fixtures including football, motiv8, girl's football, cross country and netball. Nearly 100% of Year 5/6 pupils have now attended a sporting event outside of school this year. We have had a cricket coach come into school to deliver cricket coaching to the whole of KS2 as well as external football coach linked to Yeovil Town.

It has been a busy year and will continue to be a very busy end of term as we say goodbye to a number of staff across the school who are retiring or moving on due to promotion.

For those who would like to know more about the Christian faith, Father Colin organises an afternoon Zoom session and an evening meeting.



This is worth a read: **Conversation in the Womb – A Parable of Life After Delivery** In a mother's womb were two babies. One asked the other: "Do you believe in life after delivery? ROYAL MEMORIES – MONICA WHIPP

With all the celebrations for the Jubilee going ahead, my mind goes back first to the late King's death in 1952. We all knew he was unwell, but his sudden death came as a great shock. In Church, on the following Sunday, the whole congregation wore black arm bands and most a black hat. I was rather proud of the one I had made.

Sorrow quickly turned to joy sometime later when the date of the Coronation of our new Queen was announced for the following year - especially as I was due to be doing my final placement at St Thomas' Hospital in London at the same time! I immediately decided I would be one of the crowd in the Mall, and eventually my parents agreed. Pam, my younger sister, could come and join me! So, what happened on that memorable weekend?

Pam came up to London by train on the Saturday, and the day was devoted to shopping for food (shops were not open then on Sundays), converting the single divan bed into two beds, and preparations for the special day. On the Sunday, I had hoped to introduce Pam to the service in the Chapel Royal of the Savoy, where I attended from time to time (and where the music was divine). Although we arrived very early, the chapel was full, but we were lucky and managed to find two seats at St Martin-in-the-Fields for an inspiring service. It was only a short walk to the Mall to see where a good place would be to view the processions. Viewing from the road itself would not be easy, as it was to be lined with police and the view would be difficult for a short person. However, some way back from the edge of the road, there was a raised pavement with a handrail which we thought would give us extra height (behind that were ranks of stands).

As Monday was a working day, I left Pam to pack up food and went to work, but after lunch my supervisor gave me permission to go early as the Mall was filling up. I rang Pam, who came to the hospital with food and drink, and we stopped enroute for double egg and chips before getting to the Mall. Horror, it was already packed with groups displaying signs 'No Vacancies' but we were lucky and eventually found standing room on the raised pavement just opposite Clarence House - just where we wanted. There was no room to sit down but it was pouring with rain, so we made the best of it. Later in the evening we did just manage to sit.

The evening passed quickly, there was a continuous stream of traffic of many famous people (who we all cheered) and police on horses, plus the usual dust cart. They had the biggest cheer! Pam and I explored the Park behind the stands where there were rows of port-a-loos and stop cocks for water. Also, an incessant flow of flag sellers and programme sellers. At about 10pm, a voice over the mikes announced the Mall was being closed for the night and the lights would be dimmed, and we were advised to settle

down. We were woken earlier than expected by the mike saying there was some exciting news! Everest had been climbed! A cheer went up. Shortly after, the Mall was opened, and droves flooded in, and the stands filled up. We were told to get up off the ground, collect all rubbish and remove stools. It was fine at first as the procession began to assemble, with many famous people passing. The Queen of Tonga had a special cheer.

Eventually the procession started with Military etc, followed by special guests and at long last the Queen herself and the Duke. The cheering was terrific. Eventually, the mike was switched to Westminster Abbey, and we heard the whole service. The music was amazing, the shouts of 'Long live the Queen' were deafening. It was awe-inspiring. The bit I felt was most important was not so much the crowning, but the swearing by the Queen of the Coronation Oath, and when Philip knelt to swear his oath. I can still feel the shivers run down my back. The two other memories I have, was that the service was basically a Communion service, with the crowning etc inserted, and the silence in the Mall during the service. As we turned the pages of the official programme, the was a loud rustle, that was all.

After the service, the procession went round London, so we tucked into our lunches in now pouring rain, pitied the Guards with their dripping bearskins and then cheered the guests as they came back to the Palace. The Queen of Tonga refused to have the canopy up and waved excitedly. We all knew when the Queen's coach was approaching as the cheering became deafening. Pam and I held up our cameras and amazingly we did get a picture of the newly crowned Queen. Most of the visiting guests had the canopies of their carriages down and they too got very wet.

After the last of the procession passed, there was a surge to reach the top of the Mall to watch for the balcony appearance. There were high crush-barriers to prevent people leaving the Mall but somehow, we were hauled over them and stayed to watch the newly crowned Queen and the Royal Family appear. Again, the cheering was tremendous. At last, tiredness - and the cold and rain and hunger - made us decide to leave for a hot bath and good meal at my bed-sit. We were tired but very happy.
