#### EAST COKER VILLAGE HALL CHARITABLE TRUST

Many of you will be familiar with East Coker Village Hall. This is one of the largest in the area, with excellent parking and good facilities. Built in 1979/1980, the hall was officially opened in 1981 and is now beginning to show its age. Regular maintenance and repairs as well as various improvements have been carried out over the years. This autumn, the installation of new main entrance doors will improve security, ease of access and improved insulation for users. During the 2022 financial year, the hall cost just under £20,000 to run and maintain. During the current financial year, these costs have amounted to some £18,000 to date.

Well used by a wide range of groups, clubs and classes, the Hall is run by a committee of trustees. To ensure that the Hall continues to be a valued community facility, the current trustees would welcome new committee members to assist in the running of it. You should be committed and be prepared to take on the responsibilities associated with acting as a trustee. A mixed bag of weather this summer, ranging from very hot to very cool and a lot of rain. Well, of course it's well known that gardeners are never totally happy with the weather conditions. The grass has grown apace and we've too many French and runner beans. However, we should be grateful that we haven't experienced the wildfires and earthquakes that other countries have faced, or the floods recently suffered here by many.

Over the last few months, as well as the meetings at East Coker Hall, we enjoyed an afternoon visiting some local gardens, followed by tea and cakes, thanks to our members. The talk in August about Ascension Island, which several visitors attended, proved very interesting. Our September meeting was held at Brimsmore, when a member of staff spoke about plants for autumn colour. Following the talk, members had the opportunity to take advantage of the 25% discount shopping evening. We now enter the autumn and winter months, with longer evenings - time to get out the catalogues and plan next year's sowing and planting. Bulbs will be distributed at the October meeting, courtesy of the Gardens Group, which will need planting up and cossetting, ready for judging in March/April.

The fuchsias distributed in March were judged at the August meeting. Our members had grown some superb specimens. A voucher for the Gardens Group was awarded to the winner.

We were delighted that some of our members exhibited very successfully at East Coker annual Flower and Produce Show held in August – congratulations to all of them.

We try to provide a varied programme during the year. Bulbs will be distributed in the autumn for the competition to be held next spring. Day trips are arranged to places of interest.



**Wednesday 25 October - The Old Oak** (2023) – a Ken Loach film, which had its World Premiere at Cannes this year.

**The Old Oak** is a special place. Not only is it the last pub standing, but it's also the only remaining public space where people can meet in a once thriving mining community that has now fallen on hard times after 30 years of decline. T J Ballantyne (Dave Turner) the landlord hangs on to The Old Oak by his fingertips, and his predicament is endangered even more when the pub becomes contested territory after the arrival of Syrian refugees who are placed in the village without any notice.

Wednesday 29 November - Empire of Light (2022) – this is a romantic drama directed by Sam Mendes.

Set in an English coastal town in the early 1980s, the film is about the power of human connection during turbulent times. It stars Olivia Colman, Michael Ward, Toby Jones and Colin Firth.





Wednesday 31 January 2024 - The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry (2023)

This film is based on the novel of the same name by Rachel Joyce. Directed by Hettie Macdonald.

The film tells the story of pensioner, Harold Fry (played by Jim Broadbent), who goes out to post a letter in Devon to an old friend (played by Linda Bassett) and decides to go on walking to deliver it in person – in Berwick upon Tweed.

Thank you to everyone who supported our Golden Jubilee Event in June. Our records go back to 1973 but we have been reliably informed that the Preschool was on site at the Pavilion a little before 1973. It was a beautiful day and the temperature cooled a little in the afternoon which made it a very pleasant afternoon. (I never thought I would write that a cooler temperature would be beneficial on a June day!). There were many photos to look at, cakes and refreshments to enjoy, raffle tickets to buy, a Golden Trail to follow and many opportunities to catch up with past, present and future families. It was amazing to see you all, and we raised £675.

Our renovated planters have provided the children with many learning opportunities. The amazing June weather has meant that the strawberry flowers have made sweet strawberries. We put a net over the plants

to protect the fruit from the birds and watered the garden regularly. The children have enjoyed searching for red strawberries, picking them, washing them and eating them at snack times. Runner beans were not as successful on germination, but a donation of climbing French beans means the tripod was covered and the children enjoyed observing how far the bean plants travel along the fence. Our four pumpkin seeds germinated, and we have pumpkins! We also gratefully received a donated cucumber plant and autumn fruiting raspberries. The cucumbers were picked, washed and eaten fresh from the garden for snacks.

#### EAST COKER SCOUT GROUP

Over the summer, Faye, Charlie and Emily headed off to South Korea for the World Scout Jamboree.











After their non-stop flight from Heathrow, they used the underground system to get to Seoul for their hotel and then regularly thereafter as they travelled around Seoul.

During the first three days in South Korea, they tried out the local cuisine and the whole UK Contingent visited the Demilitarised Zone with North Korea.



They arrived at the Jamboree in Saemangeum on the day of the

Opening Ceremony. Having found and walked to their campsite, they headed off to the ceremony. Unfortunately, they were not allowed in as the arena was too small for the number of scouts at the site. This was an initial indication of the issues to come over the next few days.

The Jamboree organisation did not deliver the site and conditions expected of a World Scout Jamboree. Many of you tional nows items about the conditions at the comparise. Our scouts

will have seen the international news items about the conditions at the campsite. Our scouts spent 5 nights at the Jamboree site and, fortunately, avoided the



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worst conditions. They demonstrated considerable resilience and continued in the spirit of scouting with a day of water activities, a coach trip





offsite for a tea ceremony and meeting up with many scouts from other countries - swapping badges, tshirts and scarves as they went.

The decision was taken by the UK Contingent that the conditions at the Jamboree campsite were insufficient for a safe experience and, hence, all the UK scouts were withdrawn and moved back to Seoul. Many, many buses were shuttling scouts to Seoul. Our scouts briefly ended up in a ballroom whilst waiting

for rooms to be allocated; bags piled high.



A revised Jamboree programme of activities was established to ensure the scouts continued their cultural experiences and the people of Korea opened their hearts to them.



The Closing Ceremony was re-arranged to be held within the Seoul World Cup Stadium and this allowed all of the scouts from around the world to come together again. After a formal Closing Ceremony, an amazing two-hour K-pop concert was performed to close out the Jamboree.



The World Scout Jamboree in South Korea certainly was a jamboree of paradoxes. Whilst it was not what Faye, Charlie and Emily had expected, it certainly provided a multitude of new challenges.

They met many scouts from around the world, experienced Korean culture, became more resilient, made it home safely, had a wonderful time (in spite of everything), and left the traveling Jamboree as more connected and engaged world citizens.



Thank you to everyone who helped support them and enabled them to have this adventure.

Another international experience was undertaken over the summer. Ruby went to Iceland for her Explorer Belt Award. This requires a 10-day expedition as part of a team outside of the UK. Ruby and the team chose to travel to Iceland. They met up with local scouts and stayed in Reykjavik at a scout hut. Over the ten days, they visited thermal springs, geysers, hiked across the hills, completed the Elemental Badge at an Icelandic national campsite and walked behind a waterfall.



To complete the Explorer Belt Award, Ruby and the team presented their planning, budgetting, organisation and the expedition itself to an audience upon their return.

International opportunities are highlights for anyone within scouting. Faye and Charlie have now signed up for Roverway 2024 – this will be held in July / August and involves an exploration phase, a main camp experience in Stavanger and then two days after the event in Copenhagen.

Coming back to East Coker, our beavers have a new leader. We are pleased to welcome Stuart (Weasel) who is already finding his feet with the Fun and Friends ethic within our colony. Last week, the beavers were learning a few words of Welsh to play a game as part of learning about the United Kingdom. The cubs started the term out at Pendomer cooking in the woods and have an active programme planned for the rest of the term.

The scouts built catapults (in the end in the dark) and then the following week tried to launch water sponges at each other – with varying levels of accuracy! The scouts first event will be a Backwoods weekend in October where they sleep under a tarpaulin and prepare / cook survival food.

Our Young Leaders continue to provide superb support within each section – Faye (beavers/cubs), Emily (cubs) and Charlie (scouts). Faye has now completed her Young Leader training and is awaiting its award.

It has been so lovely to welcome back everyone to East Coker Primary after the summer holidays, as well as welcoming our new families who have joined us this term.

As we begin a new academic year, it is always interesting to reflect on the successes from the year before. There have been quite a few highlights for us over the last academic year. Our School Council did a fantastic job making huge improvements to our lunchtime play. We have created zones with many activities available to the children to learn about teamwork and leadership, and it has significantly reduced lunchtime behaviour issues and has provided a family feel to lunchtimes as different ages work together to create dens and role play on our Viking longboat.

During the year, we also had writing moderation from the local authority and an Ofsted inspection in May. We were really pleased that the inspector recognised the following features and strengths of the school:

- Pupils, staff and governors are proud to be part of East Coker Community Primary School
- Parents and carers speak highly of the support which the school gives their children
- Leaders and governors have high expectations for all pupils
- Pupils work and play well together

As seems to be the normal in schools at the start and end of the term, we have been exceptionally busy and have achieved lots already, considering it is still only September.

Our children are settling in well to their new classes, getting to know their new teachers and teaching assistants as they get used to the different expectations as they move up through the school. We currently have seven classes and will be moving to single aged classes over the next several years starting from reception. This is due to the drop in birth rate. This means we have been able to transform a classroom into an Art and Design Hub where art and design and technology lessons can be taught by our very experienced higher level teaching assistants.

This year, our themes are Once Upon A Time for the autumn term, with a focus on WWII in juniors and Space in infants. This is followed by Save The Planet in the spring term focusing on sustainability and climate change, and in the summer, we will be looking at the Olympics through our Superheroes topic. We have a very exciting year ahead!

The Year 4 children are visiting the Bristol Hippodrome this week to watch Charlie and the Chocolate Factory as part of their art curriculum. Our Year 6 pupils will once again be camping at Great Wood for the week while they experience archery, climbing, grass sledging and tackling the high ropes as well as many other activities around teamwork and leadership.

We pride ourselves in offering a well-rounded education, and our wide range of after school clubs continues to help promote this amongst our pupils. This term, we offer photography, art, choir, rugby and football in addition to many other clubs.

Our School Council, Year 6 Ambassadors and House Captains have all been elected and are fully embracing their new roles within the school. The School Council will be taking the lead in creating an outdoor reading area and make further improvements to our outdoor lunchtime provision, such as creating music and art areas and further improvements to our 'wheel' zone.

Once again, over the holidays our site manager has been busy making improvements to our school building with lots of painting and repairs around the school. Our infant block toilets have had a brand-new makeover which is fantastic! We have also had all our windows replaced in the infant block and drain improvements led by the local authority. In addition to this, our staff have been very busy as many have moved round classes and there has been lots of tidying up and clearing out!

Following a hugely successful seven years of chairing, including two very positive Ofsted inspections, the last one in May 2023, we say thank you to Mrs J Bickerton who is stepping down as chair this year. Thankfully, Mrs Bickerton will still be helping out in school and supporting our library ambassadors. I would like to take this opportunity to say a huge thank you for all her hard work over the years on behalf of everyone in our school community. We have made significant improvements to the school during this time and that is due to the ongoing support of the governing body under Mrs Bickerton's care.

As we move into the next cycle of school improvement under the guidance of our new chair Mr Ian Haig-Brown, we will continue to review our school provision and look to gather views from our school community, as we work to create a plan to prepare our children for the challenges they will face in their own futures.

If you have young children and are looking at schools over the next term, you may wish to come and see us during our special open morning for prospective parents for Reception children starting in 2024 on **Saturday 14 October from 10am-12pm**. Please come along if you are looking for a place in Reception in September 2024. This will be a great opportunity to have a good look around the site to see what we offer. Parents are then welcome to book a personal tour during the school day to see what it is like in action and have a chat with the head teacher.


